

The 25th Arthritis Foundation Classic Auto Show and Cruise-In


t all started a quarter-century ago in central Ohio, when Bob Lincoln, president of the Central Ohio Chapter of the Arthritis Foundation, and Buick dealer

They created a classic car show. The first event, held in 1982, featured just a few cars and raised \$50,000. From that humble beginning, this Dublin, Ohio, event has become a recognized national show. This year, some 1,500 cars showed up, and the event raised an amazing \$250,000.

The Dublin Metro Center (near Columbus) is a magical place for such a show: a business park that offers a great background and area for all car types. This year's event had heavy musclecar representation with huge, 6-foot trophies awarded to the winners. The featured margues for the show were the Camaro, Firebird and Mercury.

The Camaro area was packed with just about everything from the '60s and '70s musclecar era: COPOs, 396 cars, Super Sports, Rally Sports, Indy pace cars and restomods—you name it. Meanwhile, in the Mercury area, there was a significant gathering of late '60s 351 and 428 Cougars, which was certainly appropriate, seeing that 2007 is the 40th anniversary of the first Cougar model (and of course of the Camaro, too).

Much of the credit for the success of this event goes to Lindsay Smith of the Arthritis Foundation, Central Ohio Chapter, who oversaw the many details. Also, thanks must be directed to crane operator Jay Poloni, who gave us an aerial view of the show that displayed the immensity of the gathering.
